## Human rights in Qatar

During the 22nd edition of the World Cup from November 20th to December 18th the matches and the final between Argentina and France took place in Qatar. Behind all this glory lies the lack of respect for human rights. Qatar is recognized as a country where there is immense discrimination between the citizens.



### The Rights of Foreigner workers

Workers from Asia and parts of Africa are treated like slaves. People migrate voluntarily as domestic servants. If they do not respect the laws of the workers they are beaten, their wages withdrawn or subjected to severe deprivation of liberty.

### The Lack of Women's Rights in Qatar

Women and girls are under the direction of their husbands or fathers they are not responsible for their bodies. They are not allowed to choose for themselves. They cannot make decisions. If they marry, they don't necessarily choose their husbands. The article 16.2 of the Universal Declaration of Human rights states: "marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses. Qatar doesn't respect Women's rights.

### Girls and education

Most schools are non-co-educational Education is compulsory for all children Qatar currently has 113 primary schools: 60 for boys and 53 for girls. There are also some 56 preparatory schools (28 for boys and 28 for girls) and 41 secondary general education colleges (19 for boys and 22 for girls). The minimum age of marriage for girls is 16 while the minimum age for boys is 18 and 53 for girls.
